Matt Tarr and I had sent a few emails to each other last summer about the draft deer wintering area rec's. I would like to see something in the rec's about recreational trails, specifically snowmobile trails in DWA's. On some of my visits with landowners and foresters the discussion of snowmobile trails in DWA's often comes up. Matt said he accidentally omitted a sentence about recreational trails that was in the first draft. Below is the version he sent to me in August 2009. Can this section be revised to include the following paragraph that Matt sent to me?

During winter, avoid or limit disturbance to deer within the DWA by routing all roads and recreational trails around, rather than through, core shelter areas. When constructing new recreational trails that will be used during winter (e.g., snowmobiling, skiing, snowshoeing), locate these trails as far as possible away from core shelter areas. Ideally, these trails should be located so that deer cannot see trail users passing by or stopping on the trail.
