Currently we say:

* Insecticides work well for these insects, however access and tree size may limit their use. Adelgid populations are most successfully treated with soil injections or soil drenches to limit exposure to non-target insects. Contact the NHDFL forest health office

for specific information on products, dosages and application methods.

Mu questions for you:

1. Is this statement just true for HWA or does it also include balsam woolly adelgid.
2. Should I include any wording about bark treatments? Do you know enough yet? For example, what about changing the second sentence with this sentence:

Adelgid populations are most successfully treated with systemic treatments (soil injections, or soil drenches or bark drenches) to limit exposure to non-target insects.

Is that what you call it- bark drenches? Thank you for your feedback.
